***Immigration Control: A Catholic Dilemma?*, 84 U. DET. MERCY L. REV. 73 (2007)** (attributing the discordant views among vocal Catholic lawmakers and citizens on immigration control to differences in the prudential application of shared principles, and urging good-faith dialogue)
